ecognizing the critical role of civil society in peacebuilding and conflict prevention in West Africa, the Minister for Interior in the Republic of Ghana, Honorable Ambrose Dery asserted that sustainable peace can only be achieved "through the promotion of civil society participation in peacebuilding practice and development." The Honorable Minister who was guest of honor and keynote speaker at the opening ceremony of the 16th Session of the West Africa Peacebuilding Institute (WAPI) organized by the Kofi Annan Peacekeeping Training Institute (KAIPTC) and the West Africa Network for Peacebuilding (WANEP) on September 4, 2017 at KAIPTC.

According to the Minister, "civil society plays a critical role in conflict prevention and the promotion of peace and stability in the region."

Underscoring the importance of the WAPI training, the Minister said "one of the most effective strategies for promoting peace is through education, it is therefore imperative for peace building practitioners to receive formal training on peace building processes as peace and human capital development are key in the economic growth of every nation." Speaking in the same vein, the Commandant of KAIPTC Air Vice- Marshal Griffiths S. Evans, in his opening remarks attested to the strategic partnership between WANEP and KAIPTC, which he said is geared towards promoting civil society/civilian participation in peacebuilding practice and development. "Peace is a critical prerequisite for national development. A continent perceived as being consistently at war will

The NEWS Managers were drawn from the 15 ECOWAS member states, while the Analysts comprised four analysts and Program Officer Early Warning from the WANEP Regional Office, WANEP/ECOWAS Liaison Coordinator and two ECOWAS analysts from the Early Warning Directorate (EWD). 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TALKING PEACE

"CSOs and academia can play important roles in peace and security!" - Chukwuemeka Eze, Executive Director - WANEP

oday, our countries and communities can best be described as being under siege with non-state actors constantly and consistently questioning the sovereignty of our states. The management or lack of management of such dissenting voices have led and continue to lead to mass atrocities and various levels of violence and crimes against humanity. It is with this background that we commissioned a research on the trends and dynamics of violent extremism in the Sahel with a view to contributing to the debate, knowledge and response strategies.

The prominence of terrorism and violent extremism in West Africa is in some ways consistent with the prevailing regional security narrative that draws attention to the multiplicity of traditional and unconventional threats to state and human security. Indeed, terrorism and violent extremism have emerged onto the regional security agenda at a time when stakeholders have faced grave challenges from transnational organized crime, piracy, climate change and political instability, as well as the tragic growing inequality in all our region and communities.



With these developments and the seeming overstretching capacity of our states and its paradigm shift from a state-centric approach to peace and security, our gathering, could not have been at a more auspicious moment. The meeting aims at presenting the outcome of our yearlong research work on Violent Extremism in West Africa also offers us the opportunity to deepen our understanding of the dynamics of insurgency and extremism in our region as well as strategies for addressing them. It gives credence to the fact that CSOs and academia can indeed play an important role in peace and security and that collaborative effort is needed in addressing terrorism and violent extremism.

In doing so, of course, it is apt to consider how existing mechanisms for conflict prevention including cultural nuances that promote harmonious relations and resilience, AU and ECOWAS Counter Terrorism Strategy as well as other various programs and interventions can be adapted.

WANEP Executive Director Bags Doctorate Degree


he Executive Director of WANEP Dr. Chukwuemeka Eze recently received a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) in Peace and Conflict Studies (with bias in Conflict Early Warning Systems) from the University of Ibadan, Nigeria. His doctorate thesis titled *Impact of National Early Warning Systems of WANEP on Peace and Security in Nigeria and Ghana,* is the first doctoral thesis on Early Warning. Prior to becoming the Executive Director, Dr. Eze served as the Program Director at the WANEP Regional Office for 5 years and as National Network Coordinator for WANEP-Nigeria for 7 years.

Dr. Eze has garnered over fifteen years' experience in peace and human security with very strong flair for political and community dialogue and mediation, training, researching, monitoring and analysing of conflict trends and dynamics. He consults for a number of organization and institutions in West Africa and beyond including the UN, ECOWAS, AU, Catholic Relief Services, and the ECOWAS Member States and is the lead interface between ECOWAS Early Warning System and CSO in his capacity as the Executive Director of WANEP.

New E-Publication



he West Africa Network for Peacebuilding (WANEP) recently produced a new E-publication titled; "Violent Extremism: Armed Violence and Human Security in West Africa." The publication is a special thematic report of the WANEP Early Warning Network and Response (WARN) Program, which provides specific analysis and interpretation of violent extremism and organized crime for the period January to June, 2017. It relied on data collated from the WANEP National Early Warning System (NEWS), which is an integral part of WARN and also utilized data from the ECOWAS Early Warning and Response Network (ECOWARN). Stakeholders Endorse WANEP Early Warning Outputs

ore and more partners and key stakeholders are relying on the WANEP highly-analytical early warning and response outputs to make informed decisions for their project interventions on security threats and conflict prevention. These outputs include policy briefs, incidence and situation reports, weekly highlights and thematic report. In Nigeria, the United Nations Development Project (UNDP) utilized the incident report generated by WANEP-Nigeria on kidnapping for their project implementation on security threats in Nigeria. In Guinea, regular updates on road traffic accidents received wide visibility and has been acknowledged by the transport sector who has initiated collaboration with WANEP-Guinea.

Women CSOs Trained on Conflict Prevention and Mediation

rom August 21 to September 1, 2017, Ms Kesia-Onam Birch, WANEP Program Officer WIPNET and Peace Education attended advanced training in Negotiation and Mediation at the Clingendael Academy in the Netherlands. Ms Birch was one of 20 women mediators from across Africa who participated in the third edition of the programme aimed at developing and strengthening the mediation skills of participants for effective conflict resolution.

The theme of the two-week course is titled "Negotiation and Mediation as an Instrument for Conflict Resolution." The trained participants will form a pool of trained women mediators to be included in the AU Roster of the FemWise and subsequently utilized for mediation across the continent. FemWise is a recently established Pan African Network of Women in prevention and Mediation. The case study on the Liberia Women Mass Peace Action which was conceptualized and driven by the WIPNET program of WANEP was a reference point in many of the sessions demonstrating the success of this intervention and giving many lessons.

The training tackled diverse subjects particularly the issue of developing a more inclusive mediation process. According to Ms Birch, "there is resistance towards designing a more inclusive negotiation process. However, having an inclusive mediation process is having a gender sensitive designed peace agreements which are able to stand the test of time!"

Capacity Building for WANEP staff

n the quest to ensure optimal delivery on its vision, WANEP regularly builds staff capacity to equip them with the requisite skills for delivering on organizational goals. In this wise, The Regional Coordinator for Research, Monitoring and Evaluation at the WANEP-Regional, Mr. Vincent Azumah conducted refresher training on basic Monitoring and Evaluation for staff of the WANEP-Sierra Leone National Office. WANEP adopts a bottom-up approach to program implementation which enables the national offices to carry out interventions which responds to the security threats in their countries while the Regional Secretariat provides oversight. M&E is a very critical aspect of programming, the training was to prepare the staff to be able to evaluate their programs and make adjustments where necessary.

Similarly, the Regional Secretariat through its Finance Department also provided refresher training to the finance departments of WANEP-Benin and Togo on the Tally Accounting system based on request from the networks. The new accounting software allows for credible and transparent financial transactions between the Regional office and the national networks. The new system has contributed significantly to improved organizational accountability.

WANEP, Partners Validate Research on Violent Extremism

he Executive Director of WANEP, Dr. Chukwuemeka Eze, has expressed concern over the rising spate of violent extremism in the region. According to him, "our countries and communities can best be described as being under siege with non-state actors constantly and consistently questioning the sovereignty of our states. The management or lack of management of such dissenting voices have led and continue to lead to mass atrocities and various levels of violence and crimes against humanity." Dr. Eze made the observation in a paper presented at the Research Validation Workshop on the trends and dynamics of violent extremism in the Sahel held on September 28, 2017 at the WANEP Regional Secretariat. The paper was read on his behalf by the Administrative Manager, Mrs. Esther Gordon-Mensah.

Worried by the spate of violent extremism especially in the Sahel, WANEP commissioned a research on the trends and dynamics of violent extremism in that region with a view to contributing to the debate, knowledge and response strategies to tackle the iden-

tified threats. The validation was a platform to present the outcome of the yearlong research work on Violent Extremism in West Africa and also an opportunity to deepen the understanding of the dynamics of insurgency and extremism in the West African region and proffer strategies for addressing them.

The Research was conducted by two renowned academicians; Dr. Festus Aubyn and Dr, Nathaniel Danjibo.



WANCP Stories of Change

FAOUZIA DEDJILA: The Icon of Peace in SOKODÉ

ocated 335 km to the North of the Togolese capital Lomé, Sokode is mainly populated by Moslems and considered as the central point of commercial activities. It is also regarded as the biggest town in the Central Region populated with business men and women both indigenous and foreign and houses technical institutions, primary schools as well as secondary institutions, both private and public. Sokode is not different from other towns in Togo where traditional festivals are celebrated and ob-

served each year. The festival of Adossa-Gadaou is celebrated in Sokode every January. In 2015, there was a serious disagreement between two clans; the Toure in the Didaoure locality and the Mola in the Komah locality on the choice of the date of the festival. This disagreement was almost escalating into violence when Ms Faouzia Dedijila intervened.

Ms FAOUZIA DEDJILA is a beneficiary of the Dialogue and Mediation training program organized by WANEP-Togo. Using the negotiation skills she acquired from the training, Ms Dedjila initiated a mediation session between the two clans and was able to convince the leaders to accept the dates. She also facilitated dialogue sessions with the community members to solicit their support and commitment to the peaceful resolution of the conflict. This process took over two weeks of meetings and discussions. Finally, the community members understood each other and agreed to celebrate the festivals on two different dates.

"It has not been easy to lead the people to change their mindsets on things they believed they knew and believed in. Peace had to prevail because my skills enabled me to lead them all to understand that without peace they cannot have any development and that peace is the foundation of all people and their development."

Peace Births Development

évé is a village located over 50 km from Lomé, the capital of Togo. Kévé is made up of three communities, namely Nyimé, Ataviépé and

Itcha with one primary and one secondary school only. In order to facilitate the development of the village, a Development Committee was set up, led by Togbui AGBAKPLI III under the chairmanship of Mr Agbemade.

One will think the idea of having a Development Committee will be a welcomed idea by community members who will happily support the various development initiatives implemented by the Committee. Unfortunately, this is not the case! Since the setting up of the Committee, community members have opposed every idea suggested by committee members. This show of intolerance and misunderstanding has considerably slowed down the development of the community and halted some of the development works initiated.

This was the situation in Kévé until the intervention of WANEP-Togo through the activities of the Women in Peace Network (WIPNET) Program. Under WIPNET, WANEP-Togo held several sensitization and awareness activities highlighting the values of peace and the need for a peaceful coexistence in the community. These various activities helped to inculcate in community members the importance of tolerance and respect for each other's opinion, thus helping them to support the leadership of the community through the development committee. Furthermore, they understood that without peace, there will be no development of the community and after the sensitization programs, many of the members confessed to being influenced by the peace messages.

WANEP-Togo has continuously propagated the message of peace in the community and this has had tremendous results. For instance, the women of Kévé have been applying these new ideas into their situation in the community and as a result, there has been a total transformation of the community. The relationship between the Development Committee and the community members is more cordial and they are collaborating with members of the development committee in ensuring that development projects are implemented.

WHO WE ARE

he West Africa Network for Peacebuilding (WANEP) was conceived in 1996 but formally launched in 1998. Unlike other activist organizations, WANEP strategically chose to engage major actors, particularly government actors in a bid to establish a platform for dialogue, experience sharing and learning, thereby, complementing efforts at ensuring sustainable peace and development.

WANEP is a member of the Peace and Security cluster of the African Union's (AU) Economic and Social Council -ECOSOCC representing West Africa and also has a Special Consultative Status with the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). WANEP is the Regional Secretariat of the Global Partnership for the Prevention of Armed Conflicts (GPPAC).

OUR GOAL
